

DIVISION OF CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

CULTURAL GRANTS ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Division of Cultural Activities will grant money on a 50-50 basis to non-profit clubs (our club is registered as a non-profit club) for the building of a museum, library and meeting hall for cultural educational films etc.

I would advise that I have spoken to an officer in the Sydney office of the Division of Cultural Activities and was advised that our club would be eligible for a grant for a new building. Our assets would appear to be sufficient for the club's share on a 50-50 basis, that is approximately \$60,000, so if we could build a suitable building for around this figure, no further funding would be needed from our club.

One of the requirements for this grant is that a development application, together with drawings, must be approved by the local council, such drawings to be prepared by a qualified architect and in this regard our club member Bill Burrows has been kind enough to offer his services in order to prepare the draft application for council approval. I would also advise that after having spoken to the Town Planner at Drummoyne Council, and having shown him the list of tenants at present using the facilities of the hall, he was most helpful and could see no objection to the erection of a new hall as we had existing use of the hall on this site. I would point out that our architect has agreed to prepare these drawings which are to accompany our development application on a no fee basis and in this regard I take this opportunity to extend our thanks to him. The only costs which will be incurred in endeavouring to obtain this development approval will be a fee charged by Council being the application fees which I am advised will be approximately \$190.00.

I would stress that should we be successful in obtaining this development application, this will then be incorporated with our application to the Division of Cultural Activities and should this application then be successful the entire project shall then be placed before the members for your agreement or rejection.





VALE DENNIS C. FIELD

On February 12 last Dennis C. Field died suddenly and unexpectedly at his home in Salcombe, Debon, England at the age of 63.

He had served the Veteran Car Club of Great Britain in the honorary capacity of Chairman of the Dating Committee continuously from 1950 and Research Historian from 1952. Added to these offices must be included that of Gazette Editor 1949-1959 and Librarian 1952-1971, a total of nearly thirty years.

His insatiable appetite for technical facts, plus dates of manufacture of veteran vehicles and a phenomenal memory for detail stemmed from the acquisition of and his avid determination to establish the identity and date of a 1902 Hanzer in 1945, two years after he had joined the V.C.C. Later in 1957 the Hanzer was succeeded by a 1913 Swift, Cyclecar and further rally participation resulted.

Undoubtedly from this small beginning and his earlier determination to amass a large reference library he became and was recognised throughout the veteran car world as its greatest historian, all of which culminated from his dedication and search for the truth no matter what effort was entailed nor its duration.

When Dennis set a date on a vehicle and had this date ratified by his committee it was seldom queried. This skill, truth and his prestige was recognised not only in hiw own country and also Europe and by other far distant eminent historians, such as the late Dr. Alfred Lewerenz of the H.C.C.A. in California and locally, George Brooks of the S porting Car Club of South Australia but by the Federation International des Voitures Anciennes, when in 1968 he was elected to first president of F.I.V.A.'s Technical Committee for a term of three years. Tributes from many countries and peoples confirmed this recognition.

The knowledge of his untimely death reached me in a letter from his wife "Mary" then by telephone from Pam during the exacting final weeks prior to the International Rally. An extract from my reply is as follows:

"I believe that the best tribute we can pay Dennis is to inform you that his name, resulting from his sincere and tireless approach to research and as I consider, senior historian in the field of veteran cars was every bit as much a household word with members of the Veteran Car Club of Australia as it has been over the years with the V.C.C. of G.B. At the time (of hearing the news) I was in conference with our International Rally Committee which includes George Green and John Thomson, Max Roberts who is Rally Director and my lieutenant on our Dating Committee, also Len Sheen, President of the V.C.C.A. (N.S.W.) and current Federal President. All were stunned at the news. (Continued on Page 15.....

"For myself I have lost a very sincere friend as well as associate for undoubtedly our interests were on the same plane."

From the early beginnings of our club I corresponded with Dennis, then in 1962 for the first time had the opportunity to meet with him in London at the then Fitzhardinge Street office of the V.C.C. and later at his home, then in Swindon. His invitation to me to sit in on the V.C.C. Dating Committee at any time I was in London was readily accepted and this initial meeting, together with subsequent similar meetings, proved invaluable both in the inaugural setting up period and later developments of our own Dating Committee.

Many members of our club owe a debt of gratitude to Dennis Field for his more-than-generous attitude to part freely with knowledge often gained through years of research.

I for one will miss his counsel but am more than pleased to read that Mary Field has joined the V.C.C. Dating Committee and will continue to act as Club Historian.

In her last letter to me, Mary Wrote:

"I hope to be able to carry on with Dennis's research work as I have worked with him for some years. I may not have all the information at my fingertips but I have been well trained."

POSTAGE, a considerable saving this year due to co-operation between Editor and Events Director.

PROPERTY. We have acted on the recommendations set out in Bill McCarthy's Report 1977 and have paid out the Overdraft Account, so there is nothing owing to the bank on either property. Also, we established a sinking fund to meet redemptions of members' debentures. The balance of the Sinking Fund as at 31.5.78, \$4,801.86.

I take this opportunity to thank the Committee for their co-operation, with very special thanks to Bill McCarthy for his assistance, advice and for doing such an excellent job in looking after our lettings.

Also, a special thanks to Keith Carden for his co-operation and assistance with the handling of all the accounts for D.M.T., G.I.O., etc.
