

The request for a Special General Meeting was read:

"We, the undersigned, being members of the Veteran Car Club of Australia (NSW)Inc., hereby request the convening of a Special General Meeting of the said club. We do so believe that the presence of branches in our club has been a source of confusion, division and bitterness. We further believe that the presence of branch accounts impedes proper financial and administrative oversight. Having said that we acknowledge the importance of having regional events and regional road worthiness inspections but recognise that the provision of these in no way requires or is assisted by the existence of branches. We believe that there is considerable and widespread support for this within the club but note that due to travel restrictions and the time frame the signatures obtained are from a somewhat restricted geographical area. We therefore call for this meeting to consider the following motion:

"That the existing branches are disbanded, any funds still held in branch-based bank accounts be transferred to the club's working account and that the club's constitution be amended to remove the section devoted to branches."

The President has spoken with Greg Roberts about the timing of the meeting. Greg Roberts on behalf of the signatories has agreed the meeting will be held after the February meeting (24 February 2022). Both sides of the proposal are invited to submit up to one page. It must be recieved by the January 2022 meeting (27 January 2022) to allow time for the information to be posted to all members. The President requested that the matter be handled professionally, discussed and voted on calmly without emotion and aggression. He is concerned that people will be upset whatever the outcome of the voting. The responses will be printed in Spit and Polish.

Neville Preston asked that the request be publised in Spit and Polish. It will be posted in the next Spit and Polish.

5. Solar cells

Jenny Fawbert attended a FIVA meeting as Australian representative and there was a focus on the environment. Worldwide clubs are reducing their carbon footprint and one way is using solar panels so clubs approach carbon neutrality. Graeme Newman commented that the Talbot Club in the UK were involved in a tree planting day. Both supported the idea.

6. Reponse from Graeme Newman about the financial management of 2018 Forbes Rally

Graeme Newman responded to comments made in July by Greg Roberts about the financial managment of the 2018 Forbes Rally, and what Greg Roberts called the scandalous actions of the organising committee. Forbes was chosen as a venue because of its location and suitability for Veteran motoring.

The alleged irregularities were not raised until 2 years after the event. The claims about the reimbursement of funds to the Forbes organising committee were clarified. At the July 2021 meeting Greg Roberts alleged that the organising committee (Graeme Newman, John Burke and Jeff Palmer) claimed in excess of \$6500 for personal expenses. In fact, the organisers were reimbursed \$4105.63 for fuel and accommodation for planning trips made prior to the event in Forbes. The amount of \$2270.04 was for other administrative costs and was not paid to the organisers for any personal expenses.

Reimbursement costs can be made legitimately given the club's not-for-profit status.

The 2018 club committee and current committee have agreed that the expenses were reasonable.

All payments were made following club rules and policies. The expenses were substantiated with receipts. The receipts from the Forbes rally were tabled at the meeting and made available at the meeting.

In regards to the alleged meeting between Doug Fulford and the organising committee when it was reported that Doug asked for receipts, Graeme said no meeting or communication between Doug Fulford, Graeme Newman, John Burke and Jeff Palmer to discuss the finances ever took place at Forbes or afterwards. The residual funds from the Forbes Rally are in the Newcastle bank account. It was approved by the committee at teh time and has been approved by the current committee. Any funds in the Newcastle Branch accounts are still the property of the VCCA (NSW) Inc.

Graeme asked that if members are discussing the matter of the Forbes financials or any other matters of a financial nature regarding the Club they refrain from suggesting there was any irregular or scandalous behavious by himself, Jeff Palmer or John Burke.

7. John Hewitt commented that he admired the strength that branches bring to the club as branches attract people who normally wouldn't be able to join. Branches make a fantastic contibution and make it a better club.

8. 1910 Lion Peugeot - Barry Shinfield

Barry has worked on some rare cars such as 1910 Lion Peugeot. The car has a twin V or 13 degrees so it meant he needed to add on 13 degrees to make the second cylinder work. He honed it. New pistons were made for the car in South Australia. It was difficult to assemble as there was a 4" gap at the bottom before the rings would engage. Other features include an inbuilt impulse for the magneto, which drives the oil pump, a tank on the firewall, transaxle and chain drive to the wheels - adding another challenge to line up wheels. Only one other Lion Peugeot is known and that's in America. Unfortunately, the car has gone to France. Barry spread some Christmas cheer with a poem.







Adapting cars to power farm machinery. I recall quite a few old vehicles adapted to power saw mills, grain mills and water pumps on country properties visited in my childhood. Farming journals and newspapers from early on to the fifties carried many hints for converting old vehicles to farm and workshop uses, and plenty of those converted cars were still in use in the 1950 and



'60s. And some original adaption units do still turn up at sales and swap meets.

From 1909 comes this diagram showing how farmers could adapt their cars to a drive belt.

Or, this suggestion using old stripper flywheels put on a shaft then wedged up against the rear wheels of the car to drive a chaffcutter or saw bench.

Among the old photos I've come across in my researching was this one of a bush mechanics set-up from the 1920's of a **1916 Overland** pumping water from

the Murray River.

Farmer B.E.A. Hay of Paringa connected the rear wheel of the Overland, by a series of levers made from saplings, to a hand pump on the river bank.


