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

Dear Lauren,

I have just received my Spit and Polish with many thanks. I look forward to getting them.

The photo on page 24 prompted my memory, and a brief search on the internet produced the attached, showing a delightful collection of kids in what must be the same car at Manly Beach.

Other pictures I have seen are of different people in this car also at Manly.

I believe this car was available in around 1907 to enable seasiders to have their photo taken, for a fee. I think the car is a de Dion-Bouton of either one or two cylinders. If so then it is an early example, probably from 1902 or 03 as the front dumbirons are curved under (by 1904 they pointed forward). The car has clearly seen use, but by 1907 it would still have been novel and quaint, attracting seasiders that wanted a photo showing them 'driving a motor' or being a passenger.

I suspect that Rob's photo was taken before the one with the kids. In the latter note the headlight has been removed (either damaged or looking too antiquated) and the nearer front guard has been bent upward.

Rob's photo shows the car around the corner from the beach (seen in the background). I wonder whether this was just a different location for the owner to attract customers (note the 'wait here' on the picket behind the car)? Or does it suggest that, for an extra fee, one could be driven around the block?

A delightful photo, and thank you Rob de Souza-Daw for it.

Good afternoon Louise and Geoff,

The latest edition of our club magazine is a wonderful read, the editorial contents get better every month, however I would like to comment about the page "THE DINKUM OIL # 23.

Analysing our veteran car I find that it does not emit pure "carbon". Based on the latest FIVA survey our vehicle covers about 200kM per year at their petrol consumption estimate, the amount of CO (Carbon Monoxide) would be in the order of 82kG for the year, or about 1/3 of the Carbon Dioxide that the average person breaths out each year!

As our vehicles expel Carbon Monoxide it is interesting to note that carbon monoxide uses 1 less atom of oxygen with carbon, we are therefore consuming 33% less oxygen atoms than a person, dog or Electric vehicle.

As an aside, our atmosphere has a Carbon Dioxide level of .04% far less dangerous than electric vehicle Lithium (number 3 on the atomic scale) and Cobalt, mined in The Congo by children for the companies owned by China, and who are deceased from the effect of Cobalt toxic poisoning by the age of 24. I don't suppose that the mining companies or electric vehicle buyers care about that.

Now, as our veteran cars cary fuel to mix with air we note that at a 10 to 1 fuel mixture we only cary on board about one tenth of the fuel that we use, where as an electric car carries 100% of the fuel load. We could look at the "clumping effect" on lithium fuel loads with fast charging which has the potential for fire and explosion but that is the electric car buyers problem, just don't park too close to one. I realise that these things are being "pushed" on to us by "ex spurts" and "politi shuns" but the last few weeks in the Canberra nursing home shows how "wonderful" they are. This just scrapes the surface of the electric vehicle fraud.

Mystery Photo

The mystery photo published in June Spit and Polish which was provided by Ian Shinfield was identified, quite correctly, by several members as being a 1913 Delauney Beleville. Somewhat naturally there was reference to the smaller of the two Delauney's which was a part of the George Green collection.

According to the Pedr Davis book 'Veteran & Vintage Cars' this was a four cylinder side valve version of about 3.75 litre capacity, capable of developing 26BHP at 2500 rpm. The vehicle was restored by George Green and some of his team with one of its first major outings being the 1970 International Rally from Sydney to Melbourne.

And whilst this may have been the first 'major' outing, it appeared in a partially restored state at the Newcastle Annual Tour in 1967 being entered by the late John Riley.





VCCA Constitution for 2023 AGM

Dear members,

As most of you will be aware, the constitution subcommittee has been working hard on updating the constitution to be more aligned with the Department of Fair Trading's Model Constitution. This has involved several feedback sessions with the club at club meeting and we thank everyone for their thoughts, feedback, and comments.

With the AGM coming up in August, we have finalised the proposed constitution and this can be found on the VCCA website. Although proxy voting has been removed from the proposed constitution, it still exists in our current constitution. Therefore, there is a proxy voting form on the website that you can print out if you wish to vote by proxy for the AGM. For our members that don't have access to internet, we will be posting them the proposed constitution and proxy slip.

Here is a summary of what key changes have been made:

- Fees: cost of membership has been removed and moved to the by-laws.
- Committee Members: the 5 committee members who are not officer bearers can be either associate or ordinary members.
- Use of technology at meetings: electronic means can constitute a quorum & members that vote online are taken to have voted in person.
- Proxy voting: no proxy voting allowed. Instead, electronic, and postal voting will be used.
- Quorum for General Meeting: changed from 20 to 15.
- Special General Meeting: if an issue arises within the club, a submission, must be
 made in writing to the committee outlining the issue, in which case, the committee will try and
 solve this issue before going to special general meeting (refer to the proposed constitution for
 more detail).

As mentioned, all these changes are in line the Department of Fair Trading's Model Constitution so that we do not need to seek legal advice to pass this through.

Thank you all for your consideration and looking forward to the AGM.

The de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis & 125th anniversary of Renault Frères



De Dion Bouton & Trepardoux set out constructing and testing steam driven vehicles in Avenue Grande-Armée Paris in 1884 (photo right) before coming up with the first high-speed petrol motor in 1895. Initially air-cooled, the first water cooled motor was fitted to the de Dion Bouton model vis-à-vis [(photo below) that began to appear on the streets of Paris in September 1899.

By the turn of the century de Dion & Bouton (Trepardoux having moved on) was claimed to be the largest automobile manufacturer

in the world with the vis-à-vis being one of the most easily recognised automobiles from the dawn of

motoring.



One belonging to Comte de Dion, founder of the first automobile club, is displayed in the foyer at 6 Place de la Concorde Paris, l'Automobile Club de France. There are other de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis models on display in France including the one driven along the Champs Elysees with the Comte on board as part of a celebratory parade at the end of hostilities. In a private Chateau there is a recent 'discovery' in remarkable condition still with the lamps in the box – unwrapped!

In June 1994 eight of the 38 de Dion Bouton entrants in the Centenary celebration of the first automobile 'race' from Paris to Rouen were visà-vis – incidentally there were 17 Renaults & 14 Peugeots.

And in November 1996, of the 'nearly ninety' de Dion Boutons entered in the RAC London to Brighton Veteran Car Run to celebrate the centenary of the 1896 Motor Car Club Tour to Brighton, there were 21 or more vis-à-vis models entered - '... this Paris maker was the oldest and most popular company of veteran days. Famed for its excellent petrol engines...' [Official Souvenir Programme p. 36]



1128 DX 75 [photo right] - an entrant in both these centenary celebrations – also commemorated the centenary of the Paris-Rouen on the 22 July 1994 and the Motor

Car Club Tour to Brighton on 14 November 1996 - the actual dates of these historic events!



In Australia the de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis is arguably the most significant and also readily identifiable of the earliest motorcars in Australia especially in New South Wales, South Australia, and Victoria.

The first car imported into NSW - a de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis - arrived in May 1900 (photo left). And the first car purchased by the State Government is also claimed to be a de Dion Bouton and the first car driven through the Blue Mountains

The *de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis* deisplayed at the National Motor Museum (photo right) is owned by the History Trust of South Australia. Another *vis-à-vis* was in recent time imported by a well known collector in Adelaide.







In Queensland, an enthusiast rebuilt the *vis-à-vis* featured in Veteran and Vintage (Davis 1981) and Clive Parmer recently purchased a *vis-à-vis* to add to his collection.

Sadly, by the end of the 20th century the once great name of de Dion Bouton was largely forgotten save for the 'de Dion axle' whereas his nemesis, Louis Renault, who relied on a de Dion Bouton motor to 'test' his système of direct drive, created an

Empire. To my mind it was important to acknowledge the contribution made by de Dion Bouton towards the Empire described by General de Gaulle as the 'first and finest factory in France' by having a de Dion Bouton present at the Premiere Rassemblement International des Models Louis Renault at Cobram in March 2023.



So it came as a wonderful surprise for those at Thompsons Beach to hear and see an 1899 3 1/2 hp model vis-à-vis teuf-teufing her way to line up with the younger Renaults and then treated to the spectacle of this delightful vehicle whizzing around the iconic river gums on the banks of the mighty Murray and on the final day leading the way to Tocumwal where the owner most generously provided

an opportunity for others to enjoy driving around the streets [photo right]

in his vis-à-vis.

According to my reckoning 8 of the 69 de Dion Bouton models listed in the 2015 Vehicle Index published by The Association of Veteran Car Clubs in Australia were in New South Wales.

As a stalwart of the marque de Dion Bouton, I'm trying to encourage owners or custodians of any tricycle, quadricycle or any other vehicle including road sweepers fitted with a single, twin, four or eight cylinder de Dion Bouton motor to get together to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis with your families & friends or come along to the gathering that will get underway once the VCCA (Vic) Annual 1 & 2 Cylinder Rally at Echuca is over.



And for those going to the 1& 2 Cylinder National Rally in Albany, a record number of de Dion Bouton enthusiasts are expected for the Festival of Motoring including the de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis from the National Motor Museum invited to the WA édition of the Deuxieme Rassemblement International des Models Louis Renault.

There will be other opportunities for de Dion Bouton and Renault enthusiasts in Australia to get together and celebrate the 125th anniversary of the vis-à-vis and Renault Frères.

2023 Singleton Tour

By the time we departed, it was after morning school drop off time, so there wasn't too much traffic about as we made our way along Vincent Street, the main street of Cessnock towards Kitchener and Quorrobolong. From there we headed through Ellalong, Paxton and Millfield to Wollombi for lunch. Unfortunately, not far from the start Henry and Andy Orton began to experience some fairly severe wheel wobbles in the Renault, so decided quite wisely to call it a day. Henry got a lift back to the start


