


THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Twenty-five Years' Commemoration Plaque.

To commemorate 25 years of veteran motoring by our club, and as a fund-raising exercise toward new clubrooms on the present site, your Committee has recommended the striking of a plaque, appropriately designed and presented as the occasion demands.

At the July Monthly Meeting these recommendations were formulated and ratified.

Measuring approximately 100mm x 88mm (4" x 3½"), the plaque appearance will be in bronze, with a silvered medallion superimposed thereon. The medallion face will include our emblem, the "Tarrant" car and the words "VETERAN CAR CLUB OF AUSTRALIA - N.S.W." all featured in relief. Below the medallion, on the bronze area, also in relief, will be the numerals 1954-1979 and the words "COMMEMORATING 25 YEARS OF VETERAN MOTORING".

The plaque will be backed with felt and its presentation will be in a green, velvet-covered jewellery case, opening lengthwise.

Each plaque will be numbered consecutively, the numerals to be machine-engraved on a raised plinth situated below the wording.

Production will be limited and due to the nature of the occasion this exclusive memento will undoubtedly become a collector's item.

At a price of \$25.00 each, sale is intended on the basis of prepayment with order, which should be addressed to the Hon. Treasurer who will allocate and register plaque numbers consecutively against the purchaser's name.

At the Garden Party, to be held at Government House on Sunday, 21st October next, No. 1 plaque will be presented to our Patron, the Governor of N.S.W., Sir Roden Cutler. The manufacturers have promised delivery within six weeks, which will ensure collection by purchasers at the September meeting.

Packaging and posting will cost an additional \$3.00.

I am sure members will be most pleased with the design and presentation of this memento of the club's successful twenty-five years of existence and I would commend purchase to you. May I also add that you place your orders early to avoid disappointment.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

The announcement at the Annual General Meeting that the Club will make a further repayment of members' debentures, leaving only approximately \$2,500 owing, must surely be regarded as a triumph for the retiring President, Len Sheen, as he ended his eventful term of office. It is also significant that there is no other liability against the property and that all funds for the repayment have come from rentals received for the house at 136 Queens Road, Five Dock and from members' donations.

When the property adjoining our Hall became available for purchase, following the owner's death, Len immediately recognised a unique opportunity to increase the Club's frontage to Queens Road from 35 ft. to 80 ft., thereby providing an adequate area for any future rebuilding programme. His proposal was overwhelmingly endorsed at a Special General Meeting and later a personal Presidential letter was circulated to all members seeking support by way of debentures. The response was most encouraging, over one hundred members subscribed a total of just on \$17,000. An overdraft was arranged with our bankers, secured by a mortgage over 136 Queens Road only, to provide the balance of the purchase money and settlement took place in mid-1976.

The overdraft was quickly repaid and half the debenture total was redeemed in September 1978. The Management Committee is confident that all remaining debentures will be cleared in the near future, well within the five-year term originally envisaged.

The Club is in a sound financial position and a major contribution towards that situation has been the foresight, business acumen and unremitting attention to its properties by Len during his term of office.

FOR THE COOKS

DATE SLICE

Filling:

Pastry:

½ lb. dates ⅓ cup water ½ cup brown sugar Juice ½ lemon

4 oz. margarine 3/4 cup sugar

1 egg

1½ cups s.r. flour

Pastry: Cream margarine and sugar, add egg, then flour. Roll out half pastry to line lamington tin. Spread filling and top with remaining pastry. Bake in moderate oven. When cool ice and sprinkle with coconut. (Chocolate or Lemon Icing).

Filling: Heat all ingredients in saucepan and cook till thickened.

RASPBERRY SLICE:

1½ cups s.r. flour 1 cup coconut 6 oz. butter

½ cup rolled oats 1 cup brown sugar 3/4 cup raspberry iam

Sift flour into bowl, add other ingredients and mix. Rub in shortening, knead thoroughly. Divide mixture in half. Place one half on greased lamington tin, pressing flat. Spread jam over evenly. Sprinkle remaining mixture over jam to cover it. Bake in moderately hot oven 30 minutes. Allow to cool slightly in tin. While still warm cut into fingers and loosen edges. Turn out when cool.

AN AUTOMOTIVE RIP VAN WINKLE

PART I - THE LONG SIESTA

A long time ago four Norwegian citizens acquired a Benz, with the intention of running a 'bus service over a distance of 150 miles from approximately the south east to the north west of Norway. The year, in fact, was 1895!

The sales talk from the manufacturer showed the car as a 'phaeton' to carry six people, but a picture in the catalogue showed eight people aboard (an increase in passenger capacity of 33 1/3%, no less).

When the Benz was tested on the road numerous problems reared their ugly heads, and some modifications were made by a qualified engineer. About July 1896 the 'bus service began, but instead of the anticipated 150 miles, the rough Norwegian roads were responsible for repeated breakdowns, which 'brought the Benz to it's knees' after only 25 miles. It was returned to the starting point and put into a shed, in which it remained unmolested for 20 years. Our Club has just completed 25 years of activity, remember? This took the Benz up to 1916, when the Kaiser war was in progress. It was bought by a motoring enthusiast who kept it for 10 years before making a gift of it to the Norway Automobile Club, but he very seldom drove it himself. In 1932 the Norsk Teknisk Museum was opened, and the Norway Automobile Club donated it to the museum. To quote from the source of this article: "And there it has remained ever since, the sole surviving example of this model, perhaps the lowest mileage veteran car in the world, and certainly the most original." Having been 'discarded' for such a lengthy period, it is original.

Some observations are interesting, such as: the sub-frame, axles, wheels and springs, presumably originally painted red and lined in black, have faded to a dusky pink; the bodywork is in dark blue, trimmed in dark brown diamond pleated leather which, naturally, has hardened and cracked; the front seat is very plain in comparison with the rear one, which is beautifully trimmed with a raised woven braiding, now a faded blue which probably would have matched the body paintwork when new.
