Delegates' Report - CHMC

Council of Heritage Motor Clubs NSW Inc Half Yearly Meeting 29 October 2022. West Tamworth Leagues Club.

Meeting opened 10.am

Well attended meeting, with delegates from clubs from almost all regions of the State. Committee's Reports Key Points:

•President Ray Ives:

- 2022 AGM had Matt Café, Transport for NSW, address members and answer questions regarding conditional registration.

• AHMF Delegate Mike Beale;

- AGM on September 17th & 18th.Unfortunately, has lostmembers from WA, NT& ACT due to various reasons. Discussion regarding the loss, and seeking other groups to become members.
- Raising the profile of AHMF discussed e.g.,a national newsletter like CHMC's'Dinkum Oil'.
- Operating Heritage Australia (OHA) presentation 'Facing the Challenges to Historic Motoring in Australia'.
- OHA & AOMC in discussion with GreenFleet re. appropriate carbon offsets.

• Webmaster Jenny Fawbert:

- Website focuses on substance over "spin", on dependable information.
- Our Facebook Posts can spike to thousands within a few hours, depending on the Post topic. Our Facebook audience is 71.90% Men and 28.10% Women.

• Registrar Alan Early:

- Number of financially affiliated clubs at 11/11/2022– 86.
- CHMC Membership 2023 Renewal Form: 3 options for clubs: Hard copy; Fillable pdf; QR code link: complete, sign and enter vehicle Census statistics online.
- Membership enquiries steady, but clubs seeking access to the Classic Vehicle Scheme with more heavily modified vehicles than CHMC would endorse don't proceed.
- TfNSW respects CHMC and our focus on heritage clubs.
- Council's 14 permanent trophies have all been sponsored for 2023.

• TfNSW Liaison Officer Peter Wright:

- Clubs processing registrations and renewals without sighting vehicles may be making a false declaration. Clubs should either physically sight all vehicles or develop processes that support the signing of Form 1259, e.g., photos.
- CHMC's CVS approval processes, for example, are considered "best practice" by TfNSW and Police.
- "Pink Slips" verify vehicles meet safe operation not HVS eligibility. Clubs need good process and procedures to meet eligibility.

- Misinformation circulated by other peak bodies is disrespectful to TfNSW, NSWPolice, and Service NSW.
- Revisions to HVS Eligibility Criteria, TFNSW- more difficult than first envisaged.CHMC were the only organisation to provide detailed feedback on a proposal to incorporate VSI6 into the HVS eligibility.
- First TFNSW Fact Sheet "Logbooks and Club Runs" due soon. Do not re-write but circulate to your members as is due to the complexity of legislation and policy behind it. Fact Sheet link will be emailed to TfNSW recognised Clubs.
- Historic Tractors National Historical Machinery Association Inc and CHMC believe there is a strong place for tractors on HVS.
- Historic Vehicle Industry Working Group: VSI6 the key document for determining if a vehicle is modified. Number Plate Changes.
- New HVS number plates have not passed camera test to date but there will be no change in size. Service NSW has sufficient plates on hand to meet demand.
- CHMC Registration Forums, Workshops and Zoom meetings. Unlikely more until after the State elections neither TfNSW or NSW Policy officers are available to attend until after the election. Clubs offering to host a forum or workshop to contact Peter.
- CHMC Registration Forum at Ourimbah, oversubscribed but 60 delegates were squeezed in. Presenters - Matthew Cafe (TfNSW Stakeholder Manager), LSC Stephen Richards (NSW Police Special Traffic Command) and Peter Wright.

• Annual Rally & Meeting Updates:

- 2023: Friday 9– Monday 12 June 2023. Entries close Monday 1 May 2023. Host Club: Wagga Wagga Veteran & Vintage Car Club Inc (WWVVCC)
- 2024: Friday 29 March Monday 1 April 2024 (Easter) Host Club: Parkes Antique Motor Club Inc (PAMC)
- 2023 AGM -Host club: Classic & Specialist Car Club North NSW Inc. 28 October.

• Election of Office Bearers:

- Vice-President, Jim Hatton. Club: Dinosaur Drivers Register

General Business

- 1. Discussion about <u>separating the AGM from the CHMC Annual Rally</u>. Motion: To move the AGM to the Saturday of the last full weekend in October. Carried.
- 2. CHMC Position Papers
 - Definition of a Heritage Vehicle. Motion: The CHMC defines a heritage vehicle as being:
 - Mechanically propelled;
 - At least 30 years old;
 - Preserved or restored and maintained in an historically correct condition;
 - Not in daily use; and
 - Recognised as part of Australia's technical and cultural heritage.

Carried unanimously.

The adoption of the FIVA-based definition strengthens CHMC's heritage focus with other peak bodies, Government and other associations, and fits now and for the future.

- Conversion of Heritage Vehicles to Electric Drive. CHMC position is based on FIVA's Position Statement. Motion: Conversion from ICE (internal combustion engine) to ED (electric drive) is such a substantial departure from the vehicle's original design to render it ineligible to be considered as a heritage vehicle;
 - No vehicle converted from ICE to ED will be approved to enter the CVS under the CHMC as an Approved Organisation;
 - TfNSW will be lobbied to develop or adopt a VSI specifically for Conversion to Electric Drive;
 - Vehicles converted from ICE to ED will not be allowed to participate in the CHMC Annual Rally; and
 - A category for ED conversion in Heritage Display Days and/or Tours will not be supported.

Motion supported subject to review of this position by CHMC in 5 (five) years' time. Carried.

- 3. Insurance members advised to look around for competitive Public Liability quotes.
- 4. <u>Supporting veteran and vintage vehicles</u>: Motion: CHMC sponsors to the total value of \$200 for the Best Veteran and Best Vintage awards at the Pre 1931 Autumn Tours. Carried.
- 5. <u>NSWHMA's Log Book proposal</u> to TFNSW includes significant variation to current Logbook Scheme conditions: HMA want Log Books to be compulsory for all and all movements, including club runs, to be captured in log books.
 - CHMC clubs understand what is a club run and the use of 60-day log books.

Motion: CHMC position maintain current status quo regarding 60-day logbooks. Carried.





What an Edwardian Woman may have worn!

Recently I had the pleasure of attending a fashion parade hosted by the Cavalcade of History and Fashion. This organisation is committed to the preservation of historic gowns and accessories and rather like veteran car owners, consider themselves to be the custodians of its collection for future generations. The group was selling some if its publications and this one caught my eye- An Edwardian House Party: 1900 -1914 published by the Cavalcade of History and Fashion following an exhibition held by the group.

It is a wonderful little book with many photographs of the items held in Cavalcade's collection dating from the Edwardian period, almost corresponding to the time frame for the manufacture of our veterans. Amazingly, on the first page is an example of a woman's dust coat and gloves worn in the car on the way to the house party! I had to buy the book!







The booklet is a useful source of information for those of us who like to wear clothing corresponding to the date of their veteran. It will be in the library for use as a reference for those interested in what the Edwardian woman wore!

We used the rest day to catch up on cleaning the brass on the FN, doing laundry, replenishing food supplies and visiting the QANTAS Founders Museum. The next day it was a must to visit the alluring outback clothing stores where Chris and I purchased more suitable Akubra hats for the relentless outback heat and sun and a few other goodies before leaving Longreach and heading north west towards Mount Isa.

mirrors in the desert. Chris and Stan arrived and flicked off the FN. It was sounding unusually rough. It was super hot and she'd been working hard. At first thinking the worst that it could be a big end bearing in the engine, they were somewhat relieved to find that the old girl had blown a gasket on the exhaust manifold. Nothing could be done on the side of the road in the searing heat and the problem wasn't getting any worse, so we swapped passengers and drivers and carried on to Winton where we

The landscape became utterly flat. The road before us totally disappeared into hundreds of square kilometres of nothingness. I thought I had witnessed plenty of nothing before out in NW NSW but this was a whole new level of nothing. Whistling Kites soared above us scouring the hot bitumen for roadkill. Maggie and I pulled over on the side of the road and waited for the FN to arrive for us to have some lunch. A little wait later and the speck of the FN approached in the far distance, glints of brass catching the sun shined back at us like survivor's

found a great camp site for the night on a nearby creek, built the best campfire of the whole trip and made jaffles for dinner while Chris carried out a repair on the failed exhaust manifold gasket.

At Winton it became clear to us that because of the nature of the rally, the long hours of driving and our personal travelling arrangements between the four of us, we didn't have time to actually enjoy what the towns we were passing through had to offer. Winton is the dinosaur capital of Australia and as much as we wanted to see the dinosaur attractions in the town, it was not possible due to the time we needed just to

get to the next stop for the night. The Waltzing Matilda centre is there as well as opportunities to fossick for Queensland boulder opal, which held a personal interest to myself as I have an opal mine at

After stopping for the night in the Julia Creek showground with other rally entrants and a great meal at the local pub we got on the road early along with a few of the veteran bikes. Driving along the Flinders Highway we saw another change in landscape. Dozens of tall rust coloured termite mounds spread across the ground and all through the bush. Three or four varieties of golden yellow wattle on a red outback soil against a bright blue sky wowed us with their

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
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
