GENERAL BUSINESS

1. Comments on membership proposals

The President requested feedback on the proposal. He has received some comments. Alan Miller asked him to elaborate. The President said the new membership structure proposed was a family rather than individual membership with the idea of making the membership more family inclusive. Andrea sent out the proposal at the end of last year. Andrea outlined that a family membership included two members of a household which would hold one vote as either an ordinary or associate member, depending on the membership

Barry Shinfield asked how it would affect his membership as he is a life member and Dorothy is an ordinary member and willingly pays a membership fee?

Geoff Yeomans is concerned about the financial side as the club would lose memberships and hence money. He said the proposal will probably mean more work for the Treasurer.

Andrea asked for more time to work on this. She requested any questions be sent to her and then she would be able to answer the questions in more detail.

Jenny Fawbert commented that the FIVA general assembly was looking at more strategies to increase club membership. Opening membership up to families and partners was seen as one way of increasing succession. Some European clubs had seen an increase in engagement.

Peter Martin queried the club's policy regarding female members. In his family there are 4 female members who own vehicles. With this proposal the club would lose 4 memberships. Under the new proposal one member of the partnership would lose voting power and would have no voice. He questioned who said that the club was not inclusive. He said in his years of belonging to the VCCA it had come up once and asked why it had been brought up again.

The President responded that the proposal had been brought up for discussion.

Peter Martin said if the club wanted to become more inclusive it should run rallies in school holidays.

Will Garthon suggested that the issue could be solved by changing the eligibility for membership. It appears that two people use one car and both are regarded as ordinary members.

The President replied that the proposal went beyond the ownership of a veteran vehicle. It was to encourage greater participation by families. He realised there would be a cost penalty.

Graeme Newman tabled the comments made at the Newcastle Branch meeting. Members asked why a change was needed. If the problem is that people don't feel included, the club needs to address this. He said, if a member has owned a veteran for longer than 5 years, the member continues to be an ordinary member even if he/she no longer owns a veteran.

The President thanked members for their feedback. He thanked Andrea who has been the driving force for the proposal. The committee will consider the comments.

FIVA General Assembly 2022

Summary of report. By Jenny Fawbert. December 2022

The dominant issues in the FIVA presentations and discussions were those related to environment matters, including impacts related to climate change, emissions and sustainability, and FIVA's responses, including developing strategies for events and enthusiasts, and advocacy for regulatory exemptions. The related topic of e-fuels and historic vehicles tests was significant.

Becoming a more inclusive as an organisation and a hobby was a repeated theme throughout the GA, focusing heavily on engaging with, and retaining, younger people in the hobby, at FIVA and the local levels. Furthering opportunities for more women to be involved was also raised several times.

Using social media and online communications more effectively has proven very successful for FIVA and a number of ANFs in the last year. The value of social and online media, e.g., FIVA's Chat Room, to connect with younger enthusiasts was reinforced by the younger, and young at heart, delegates from a variety of ANFs.

The concept of historic vehicles as cultural heritage objects was reinforced in many presentations, and in the 2022 FIVA GA Activity Report booklet. FIVA is making HVs as heritage objects a focus in its legislation lobbying activities, especially when seeking exemptions, and heritage as a vital raison d'etre for preserving and operating HVs.

Seen as cultural heritage objects, HVs have strengthened meaning to important alliances with other

heritage organisations, e.g., UNESCO and TICCIH. These alliances are vital in FIVA's advocacy efforts.

There were several mentions of FIVA looking to achieve a more effective international focus. The "World Tours" to talk directly with ANFs, that commenced in 2022 to South America, indicate a practical effort in that direction; as do FIVA World Events being allotted to several non-European ANFs; increasing ANF memberships from around the world; and greater use of hybrid digital/face- to-face meeting.

Several times FIVA's leaders acknowledged that the major issues, as outlined above, were not European but global and as such required a united effort, with which they offered to assist ANFs.

Brisbane to Broome in a 1911 Fabrique Nationale 1560

The next morning we rose and were on the road just as the sun was coming up in an effort to try and miss the heat in the middle of the day. This worked well until unfortunately the FN began to misfire again, for the first time since day one of the rally. The day was wasted a little by sitting on the side of the road cleaning out carby jets at various stops but we drove on through the desert landscape to our stop for the night at Timber Creek. We were in a landscape I had never seen before and I couldn't quite believe that anything at all could survive out in here in this parched landscape and oppressive heat.



Huge Boab trees surrounded us, their swollen bellies supporting many spindly arms reaching into the air, Kapok trees with their bright yellow flowers and blonde Buffel grass and red termite mounds covered the ground. Whistling Kites continued to circle above us and we saw at least four beautiful and masterfully constructed bowers of the Great Bower Bird. We drove into views that were picture perfect,

straight from an Albert Namatjira watercolour painting, around Victoria River. Hundreds of tall green palm trees grew at the base of an enormous dark red escarpment that ringed the highway we were driving along and stretched out into the distance

The FN had now carried us 3500kms and after eating all of our leftover fruit and snapping some photos, we crossed into Western Australia and drove the forty kilometres or so to our next stop and lay day at Kununurra.

Aside from the drive out to see the beautiful Ord River Dam, Kununurra was not an enjoyable stay. For every hour of the time we were

there, we felt uncomfortably unsafe for ourselves, the FN and our possessions. In truth, we couldn't wait to get out of there and back on the road. The town's indigenous residents are out of control and for the day and night we were there we witnessed violence towards us, theft, drunkenness, intimidation and wild disregard and inconsideration for anyone else or themselves. This should not be regarded as a racist observation. Rather, it is AN observation of the unfortunate situation that the people of this town, and many other towns, find themselves in. Unfortunately, we saw the same scene a couple of days' later at Halls Creek with theft and drunkenness and general disregard.

When we reached Fitzroy Crossing, another town with a reputation for trouble, we prepared ourselves to have rocks thrown at us crossing the bridge across the Fitzroy River as it had been reported more than once as a favoured thing to do

on traveller reviews on the trusty WikiCamps app. We envisaged the FN being the perfect target because of it being an unusual and antique sight in the outback, and the rare as hens teeth FN1560 radiator being destroyed by a rock thrown through its guts. But when we arrived, the town was

peaceful, families of locals swimming in the river below looked up to us and waved excitedly, and people waved as we passed along the street looking for fuel. Thankfully we had no trouble at all at Fitzroy Crossing and we crossed back over the bridge to the resort like caravan park on the river where we enjoyed a very pleasant stay with other rally entrants and a brilliant meal up at the resort's pub. Highly recommend staying there!

We were on our second last day of the trip, day 26. Over the last few days we had seen a rare Bush Turkey

(Australian Bustard), a pair of elegant Brolgas, a couple of dingoes and many herds of Brahman cows. We had a little more trouble with the FN. The radiator had developed a substantial spout and Chris repaired this by stuffing a piece of the grey duct tape over the split in the core and down each side. It was so successful the "temporary" repair had lasted over 1000kms to Broome. The magneto also gave us some trouble with another roadside stop for Stan and Chris to eliminate the problem and we continued onto Willare for our final overnight stay on the rally. The FN was otherwise going so well. She

was filthy and greasy and dusty but she had now successfully rolled her four skinny black wheels across the top of Australia for 4500kms of hot bitumen. With only 152kms now to go to Broome, it seemed she was actually going to make it.

Our last day on the road finally brought us some relief from the hot, dry days as a cool wind brought with it a pleasant temperature drop. We were nearing the coast now and we could feel it in the weather. All the rally participants had adopted an air of relaxation as it was not only our last day but our shortest day with regard to

mileage. We polished some brass on the FN and gave her a general clean up in preparation for the

puncture just outside of Yarraman on the second day of the rally and rolled along the road on the metal rim. The windscreen has two rock chips in the glass from a road train crossing the flat plains of nothingness to Julia Creek, the brass frame of the windscreen cracked and the support arm collapsed just before Katherine, a bolt from the front of the chassis holding the cross member was sheared off somewhere before Mary Pool, the radiator sprung a major leak somewhere near Ord River and the timber spokes on the rear wheels became noisy with clicking from the timber drying and shrinking in the timber felloes. But all

display later that afternoon outside Matso's Brewery in Broome. Thirty kilometres out of Broome I pulled the FN over and swapped places with Stan. I felt he should drive his car the final distance of the epic rally into Broome. We grinned in anticipation "Well this is it" he said, "the old FN is gunna make it..wow..she'll make it" and of course she did! And along with only four other veteran cars, the FN rolled the total 4663kms from Caboolture to Broome.

After three weeks on the road, the FN had a few battle scars. The front right rim showed damage to the metal and paint from when it shed a tyre due to a

The great times and memories made between us, the experiences we've had, the friends we've made, the enjoyment of slow driving in an open car through the outback landscape of Queensland, Northern

Territory and Western Australia, far outweigh the times we were down and as we finally finished the last few kilometres of the Brisbane to Broome rally across the top of Australia, we all felt a feeling of massive accomplishment and satisfaction, not only for ourselves, but for the incredible old FN.

 to all clubs in a print ready format. We will alert you to this when it has been distributed.
- The CVS weight limit is still 3.5T GVM for all vehicles
- When renewing CVS registration please ensure that you use CVS Renewal Agreement Form from our website http://heritagemotoringcouncil.org.au/Classic-Vehicle-Scheme.php
- EV CONVERSIONS. Conversion of an historic internal combustion engined vehicle to electric drive is such a substantial departure from original design as to render it ineligible to be considered as a heritage vehicle by CHMC. This position was endorsed by delegates at CHMC's meeting on October 29th 2022, and is in accord with that of FIVA, the international peak body for historic vehicles: https://fiva.org/download/electrification-of-historic-vehicles/. CHMC's Position Paper can be read at https://www.heritagemotoringcouncil.org.au/PUBLICATIONS.php




